Bolivia has 52 species of parrots (Family: Psittacidae). In the National Park Torotoro, there are 8 registered species which include macaw and parakeet parrots. The National Park Torotoro is located in Potosí, which is characterized by terrain with cliffs of 200 m high (canyons) that borders it. This topography and geological formations create unique landscape scenery. Its average temperature is 18°C and has an annual precipitation of 750 mm, presenting a dry, arid climate. All of these conditions are ideal for the presence, feeding, overnight roosting, and nesting of these registered parrots. It is home to the endemic species Ara rubrogenys, housing the largest population of this species in its northern distribution.
